Guide to Asia

It's never been easier to explore the world and yet it's perhaps never been more difficult to choose where to go. For those wanting something beyond Europe and the Americas, Asia is a fantastic place to travel and the aim of this guide is to empower you with insider knowledge on which country might suit you best.

Asia has inspired some of the world's greatest thinkers for thousands of years. It was a beguiling world to the first western travellers visiting across the colonial period and, to this day, holds mysteries for even the most experienced explorers. Its various countries have very distinctive identities; indeed within each country there is a rich variety of culture, landscape, food and history to be experienced. From the overgrown, magnificent Angkor temples of Cambodia, via the bustling food markets of Vietnam and the lush colonial tea plantations of Sri Lanka, to the prestigious forts of Rajasthan, India - there's an impressive array of places to see.

Here are our 3 key steps to deciding where to go:

STEP 1: DECIDE ON WHAT YOU WANT TO EXPERIENCE

The concept of "pillars" for your holiday – "must-do" experiences that will shape the overall route of your trip – can be a useful tool to help you narrow down your options. Have a look at the list of experiences I've devised on the following page and prioritise your favourites.

If lists aren't your thing, perhaps a more interesting prompt would be to consider any personal angles you have on a particular country. Do you have family that lived in a particular country during the colonial period? Do you have a favourite book set in Asia? Is there a TV programme you enjoyed that you'd like to follow in the footsteps of? Has a friend recommended a place you should visit? All are perfect places to start when considering a foray into the Asian continent.



STEP 2: FACTOR IN PRACTICAL MATTERS

You may then want to consider practical matters: your preferred travel dates and budget. Asia has a range of climates at different times of the year and it's worth considering this before deciding on a destination.

Asia also offers very good value for money, but do note some countries can be more expensive than others: food and drink in The Maldives, for example, is much more expensive than in India as it all has to be imported by boat. Want to avoid flying? Certain countries offer wonderful train journeys as an alternative. The following pages of this guide go into a little more detail about practical matters concerning destinations in Asia that you may want to consider.

SRI LANKA

With its national parks, tea-plant-covered hillsides and ancient architecture, Sri Lanka is a beauty to behold and a wonderful destination for a holiday. What we could tell you about this country could fill a book, but let's just say the sandy beaches, atmospheric ruins, mouthwatering array of curries and verdant rainforests are a good place to start.

TOP 3 EXPERIENCES

- Watch the sunset over tropical jungles from UNESCO-heritage Sigiriya Rock Fortress.
- Explore the historic architecture of the colonial Portuguese fort in Galle.
- Spot elephants and leopards in the lessvisited Wilpattu National Park.

FOOD TO TRY

- A hopper is a pancake-like dish that was brought over by the Portuguese in the 17th century and is best enjoyed with an egg and spicy sambal.
- Kottu roti is fast food at its best. A mix of sirfried vegetables, egg, spices and chopped up flatbread, it's a delicious dish best eaten with a refreshing cold drink.
- Coconut curries are a staple of Sri Lanka. A typical meal includes six or seven choices of curry with a good serving of rice.

BEACHES TO VISIT

- Jungle Beach, Kuchaveli, for its very private location and beautiful surrounding tropical forest.
- Uga Bay, Pasikudah, boasting golden sands near the undiscovered town of Batticaloa.
- Turtle Bay, Tangalle, offers a long, wide stretch of sand and is stunningly beautiful.

- Horathapola Coconut Plantation lets you absorb Sri Lankan culture in a refined setting. A colonial family home, the food here is exquisite and the hotel can arrange a visit to a local rural village.
- 3 Sisters Matara is a sleepy Dutch colonial villa next to the beach on the south coast.
- Tea Trails consists of five renovated planters' bungalows set in emerald tea plantations with luxurious service and activities galore.



BEST TIMES TO VISIT

Sri Lanka is a year-round destination with two monsoon seasons so there is a lot of confusion around when is the best time to visit. The weather doesn't run like clockwork here, and we can always be surprised by the weather in Sri Lanka! However, there will rarely be weather so dramatic that it will stand in the way of a brilliant holiday, with plenty of warm weather and sunshine.

GETTING AROUND - HOW IT WORKS

There are lots of ways to get around Sri Lanka. You may want to consider the following options:

TYPE OF TRANSPORT	PROS	CONS
BUS	Cheap, frequent, lots of network routes	Crowded, slow, unreliable, uncomfortable, little room for luggage

INDIA

Ancient, wild and colourful India is a place to behold. Too vast and diverse to encapsulate in words, this country needs to be experienced with the senses. Whether breathing in the spice-filled air of the outdoor markets, tasting the myriad flavours of local cuisines or letting the eyes take in the rich green of those famous tea-plant-filled hillsides, a holiday to India is a truly magnificent experience.

TOP 3 EXPERIENCES

- Explore the villages of the remote Luni River area near Jodhpur on a jeep safari.
- Admire views of the snow-capped Himalayas while walking in the hills around Almora.
- Search for leopards in Satpura National Park in less-visited Madhya Pradesh.

FOOD TO TRY

- Thali, which isn't a single recipe but a combination of dishes including curries, dahls, steamed rice, pickles, naan and a sweet.
- Stuffed parathas are a kind of flatbread filled with a variety of ingredients such as potatoes, cauliflower, paneer or vegetables.
- Masala dosa is a type of thin pancake made from rice and white lentils. It's served with potatoes, chutney and fragrant sambar.

BEACHES TO VISIT

- Neeleshwar beach offers golden sands fringed with tropical palms.
- Niraamaya beach is secluded and has a private feel. It's a 5-minute drive from the coastal town of Kovalam, which has many bars and shops.
- Marari beach has a long stretch of sand where travellers can sit back, relax and watch fishermen ground their colourful boats for the day.

- Bhainsrorgarh Fort, situated in rural Rajasthan, looks down from a high clifftop that juts out over the River Chabal. It's an impressive 18th century fort and staying here is like stepping back in time.
- Dera Mandara is a tranquil heritage homestay steeped in history. Located in the 'pink city' of Jaipur, it's a wonderful way to get under the surface of life in Rajasthan.
- Lotus Houseboat is a luxuriously refurbished rice barge that meanders down the quieter waterways of northern Kerala. It's an incredibly relaxing way to absorb South India's laidback culture.



BEST TIMES TO VISIT

India is a vast country with an incredibly varied weather system. At any point in the year there is always somewhere good to travel to, but the weather doesn't work on cue and it can shift and be unpredictable. In general, however, there is one distinct monsoon period from June through to August and, broadly speaking, you can visit most areas from October through to March and have a good chance of decent weather.

India is famed for its expansive train network, has a growing domestic airline service as well as characterful local ways to get about, from horse-drawn cart to air-conditioned bus.

THE MALDIVES

The Maldives has much to offer, but stress relief, luxury and unbelievable scenery come as standard. Crystal clear waters, white sand beaches and some of the world's most unique tropical architecture make the word paradise truly justified.

TOP 3 EXPERIENCES

- Relax on idyllic white sand beaches in a luxury resort, gin and tonic in hand, watching turquoise waves lap at the shore.
- Discover life on the local islands with beautiful Moroccan-style architecture, pastel-coloured buildings and old mosaic doors.
- Swim with turtles, manta rays and/ or whale sharks on a snorkelling or diving trip.

FOOD TO TRY

- Mas huni is a typical breakfast in The Maldives consisting of tuna, coconut, red onion and mild chilli combined with delicate roti flatbread.
- Fihunu Mas is a type of barbecued fish flavoured with garlic, cumin, curry leaves and onions. It's a mouthwatering meal with simple ingredients.
- Mas riha is a delicious fish and coconut curry eaten with rice and satani – a tomato salad. It's incredibly refreshing, light and fragrant.

BEACHES

Asking for where the best beaches are in The
Maldives is like looking for hay in a hay barn: nearly
every beach is spectacular. Some resort islands
closer to Male have views over the city, which isn't
quite the desert island experience certain travellers
aspire to. Generally, the resort island beaches are
pristine and perfectly maintained, while local
beaches are more 'working' in style, with boats and
other paraphernalia. Choose your beach depending
on what you want to experience.

- For ultimate luxury, a brilliant place to stay is Four Seasons Landaa Gihaavaru. It boasts some of the biggest overwater villas in the country and topnotch service.
- Makunudu Island is perfect for travellers wanting to escape the loud discos and canteen-like restaurants that are becoming more prevalent in the resorts. It's back-to-basics barefoot luxury with only 36 beach villas and a quiet restaurant and bar.
- Rashu Hiyaa in Dhiffushi is a hotel-style guesthouse with very comfortable, spacious rooms, attentive staff and comfortable loungers and parasols on the nearby beach.



BEST TIMES TO VISIT

All year round. When the rainy season does come, because the islands are so low lying, rain blows over very quickly so shouldn't affect your experience too much.

GETTING AROUND - HOW IT WORKS

The Maldives consists of over a thousand islands in the middle of the Indian Ocean. Transport revolves around the water and so can be rather limited to boats and seaplanes. Usually, resorts will handle guests' transport, with private transfers via speedboat or seaplane. For travellers wanting to delve deeper into The Maldives' history and culture with a local island stay, there are more diverse ways of getting about.

VIETNAM

Fancy a taste of fresh pineapple from a floating market or the breeze on your face as you travel by riverboat? Or would you prefer the vibrant bustle of Ho Chi Minh City and taking in the pagodas nestled amid the skyscrapers? There's something for everyone in this amazingly diverse country.

TOP 3 EXPERIENCES

- Zip through the bustling streets of Vietnam's southern capital Ho Chi Minh on a Vespa tour
- Cruise through the UNESCO-heritage karst outcrops of Halong Bay on a luxury junk boat.
- Discover the floating markets of the Mekong Delta by speedboat.

BEACHES TO VISIT

- Hoi An boasts pristine white sand beaches with a great location near to UNESCO-heritage Hoi An Old Town. An Bang Beach is a sure winner if you're looking for beautiful views, delicious seafood and a number of low key beach bars.
- Phu Quoc is an island paradise on the west coast of Vietnam, situated in the gulf of Thailand. It boasts perfect white sand beaches, undisturbed nature and some of the best snorkelling and scuba diving in the country.
- Six Senses Ninh Van Bay Resort & Spa sits on a dramatic bay with impressive rock formations overlooking the East Vietnam Sea. It's the perfect beach if you're looking for somewhere intimate and truly unique.

FOOD TO TRY

- Fresh prawn summer rolls are arguably Vietnam's most famous dish and consist of translucent pancakes packed with salad leaves, prawns and noodles. Served with a dipping sauce they are light and delicious.
- Banh mi is a baguette packed with delicious beef, fresh vegetables and/or omelette served at street stalls. They're a perfect fusion of French and Vietnamese cultures.
- Banh Khot is a miniature form of French crepe filled with tiny morsels of prawn and spices. It's a mouthful of deliciousness with a crispy and tender texture.

- The Sofitel Legend Metropole in Hanoi is over a hundred years old and a relic of the French colonial administration. The historic wing has rooms that were home to journalists covering the Vietnam War.
- The Bassac is a lovingly restored rice barge that cruises down the Mekong taking you far away from other tourists. It's a quirky and characterful experience with delicious food served on board.
- In the ancient city of Hue, La Residence is a beautiful heritage property, once home to the French envoy. In 2005 it was carefully restored into a luxurious boutique hotel and from the top of the building you can see the ancient citadel.



BEST TIMES TO VISIT

Vietnam is long and thin and therefore encompasses various climates at various times of the year. It's great for summer holidays on the beach as well as a bit of winter sun.

GETTING AROUND - HOW IT WORKS

Getting to and from the various sites generally means taking flights or overnight trains. Within cities you'll find a huge number of motorbikes and Vespas because of the exorbitant price of cars.

CAMBODIA

Cambodia is a country of light and shade, rising out of its bloody history with undoubted resilience and sparkling energy. Grand turreted temples and intricate monuments showcase the formidable talents of the mighty Khmer Empire while elegant bars, modern architecture and the brightness of its people bring us into the present.

TOP 3 EXPERIENCES

- Discover the temples of Angkor at daybreak, when the sky is a beautiful shade of amber pink and the reflections in nearby lakes are stunning.
- Sample fresh crab and fish in the coastal town of Kep.
- Visit Battambang, a sleepy market town with French colonial architecture and a wonderful river trip to discover the typical Cambodian rural landscape.

FOOD TO TRY

- Kdam chaa is a fried crab dish typical of the seaside town of Kep. It is prepared with Kampot pepper and garlic and is perfectly complemented by white sticky rice.
- Fish amok is one of the most popular meals in the country and consists of a rich and creamy curry infused with coconut milk, turmeric, lemongrass and ginger. Usually served with rice on banana leaf, each mouthful is melt-inthe-mouth delicious.
- Lok lak is a stir-fried dish of beef in a light brown sauce served with green salad. It's a very traditional Khmer dish and every region has its own take on the classic.

BEACHES TO VISIT

- Koh Rong is a beautiful island off Sihanoukville, with white sand beaches, turquoise waters and fantastic snorkelling opportunities.
- Kep beach was frequented by French colonists in the 1900s and has undergone a renaissance in recent years. It's home to a small stretch of beautiful golden sand and there is wonderful seafood in nearby local restaurants.
- Sokha beach near Sihanoukville is mostly owned by the exclusive Sokha Beach Resort and boasts pristine sands, turquoise waters and an incredibly laidback atmosphere.

- Phum Baitang is a beautifully designed stilted village with an atmosphere of understated luxury near the temples of Angkor. Set amid traditional rice paddies, it was where Angelina Jolie stayed to research the film A Daughter of Cambodia Remembers.
- 4 Rivers Floating Lodge is an idyllic nature lodge set on a bend in a river below the Cardamom Mountains in northern Cambodia. Surrounded by forests and with the beautiful river on the doorstep, there are lots of activities for outdoor enthusiasts.
- Aqua Mekong is a pioneering luxury cruise offering exclusive experiences that will get you off the beaten track to discover the true backwaters of the Mekong Delta.



BEST TIMES TO VISIT

Cambodia is located in the tropical zone of Southeast Asia and is blessed with a simple climate. A great place to visit all year round, Cambodia is exceptionally beautiful, especially in the wet season.

GETTING AROUND - HOW IT WORKS

Cambodia is a circular country with the Mekong River carving its way through the east and the impressive Tonle Sap Lake providing various waterways to meander through in the centre. Getting about usually consists of a mixture of short internal flights, river journeys by boat and transport by road.

LAOS

Far from being mainstream, Laos offers a uniquely authentic experience replete with charming people, a fascinating ancient culture and a wonderfully slow lifestyle. The seductive simplicity of its rhythms against the backdrop of a rich, magical landscape makes Laos an utterly beguiling holiday destination.

TOP 3 EXPERIENCES

- Play petanque with the locals. The classic French game, imported during the Indochine period, is a relaxed way of getting to know Laotians.
- Watch hundreds of monks give alms in UNESCO-heritage Luang Prabang: an aweinspiring experience.
- Relax in Si Phan Don, known as 4,000
 Islands, a place where the Mekong spreads into a wide archipelago and waters slow.

FOOD TO TRY

- Tam maak hoong is made from fresh strips of under-ripe papaya and a savoury fish sauce. It's a crunchy and refreshing dish that epitomises Laotian cuisine.
- Khao ji pate, or 'baguette pate', is similar to
 Vietnamese banh mi but the Lao version
 uses watercress, grated carrots and a chili
 and garlic sauce instead of coriander and
 pickles. It's a quick meal that can be eaten for
 breakfast or lunch.
- Beer Lao, while not strictly a meal, is quite possibly one of the best beers in Asia and cannot be missed.

BEACH ALTERNATIVES

 Being landlocked, Laos has no 'true' beaches to offer, but it does offer some stunning alternatives. 4,000 Islands is a stretch of the Mekong where the waters spread, leaving lots of island formations with sandy shores for travellers to relax on.

- Kamu Lodge is a beautiful eco lodge in a remote area on the banks of the Mekong River. With accommodation in luxury safari tents, it's the perfect base for outdoor adventures.
- Belmond La Residence Pho Vao is a sublime boutique hotel in Luang Prabang. With two infinity pools overlooking lush forests, it's a peaceful and private place to stay.
- Sala Done Khone is a village-style hotel on the island of Done Khone in 4,000 Islands. With waterfalls, riverside beaches and French colonial relics nearby, it's an incredible place in which to relax.



BEST TIMES TO VISIT

Laos has a laid-back climate with no coastline to bring in troublesome storms. The weather here is largely affected by altitude and topography, with a cooler mountainous north and steamier delta-plain south.

Laos is a landlocked country, with the mighty Mekong River carving its way through the north of the country. Transport usually requires a mixture of flights, boats and short car transfers.

INDONESIA

Indonesia consists of over 13,000 diverse islands spreading from the Malay Peninsula to the border of Papua New Guinea. With these islands comes a dizzying range of languages, culture and scenery, making it a stunningly beautiful archipelago with an amazing array of holiday experiences.

TOP 3 EXPERIENCES

- Watch the sunrise over Borobudur, a
 Buddhist temple built in 750-850 AD
 that is surrounded by volcanic peaks and
 lush forests.
- Spot dragons in Komodo National Park.
 The largest lizard in the world, the Komodo Dragon has a reputation for its venomous bite; what's less well known is its love of sunbathing.
- Climb Mount Bromo, an easier feat than you might think! With jeeps available to take you up to a short walk from the crater, it'll be a talking point for years to come.

FOOD TO TRY

- Nasi goreng is a signature dish and consists of stir-fried rice with a freshly fried egg on top. Prawns, chicken and vegetables are usually added to the rice.
- Satay consists of tender skewered meat in a delicious peanut sauce. Light and packed full of flavour, it's a wonderful side dish.
- Gado-gado is a healthy combination of assorted vegetables, including pak choi, cabbage, spinach, bean sprouts, green beans and carrots, covered in a mouthwatering peanut sauce.

BEACHES

- Pink beach on Flores is an incredible rose colour due to its coral sands. With amazing snorkelling opportunities it's an amazing beach experience.
- Jeeva Beloom's beach in Lombok is essentially private – attached to the eco lodge and a stone's throw from the villas. The snorkelling offshore is fantastic and it's a wonderfully secluded experience.
- Gangaa Island is an off-the-beaten-track beach with some of the best diving and snorkelling in the whole of Indonesia. It's incredibly hidden with only one resort on the island and a sleepy village.

- MesaStila on Java is a working coffee plantation with 27 villas spread throughout the grounds. It has an atmosphere of understated luxury with views over mountains and forests.
- Nihiwatu Resort on Sumba Island is stunningly situated on a cliff edge overlooking the sea. A luxury resort with a conscience, it's a fabulous place for surfing or just relaxing with a cocktail.
- Mutiara Laut is an elegant 39-metre yacht cruising through the deep blue waters of eastern Indonesia, including visits to Komodo and Flores.



BEST TIMES TO VISIT

The scattered archipelago nation understandably has quite a broad range of weather patterns, but generally it's dry and sunny from May to October, making it a perfect summer getaway destination.

BORNEO

FOOD TO TRY

- Sarawak laksa is a soupy rice noodle dish usually made with prawns in a thick coconut broth. Served with crunchy beansprouts and sometimes with shredded chicken, it's the state staple.
- Kolo Mee is a typical breakfast in Malaysian Borneo, and combines light egg noodles with barbecued pork.
- Ayam Pansuh is a traditional Iban dish made with chopped chicken, mushrooms, lemongrass and tapioca leaves cooked inside bamboo over an open fire.

BEACHES

- Pantai Dalit beach, Sabah, is surrounded by 400 acres of lush tropical vegetation, making it the perfect location for beach and nature lovers.
- Tunku Abdul Rahman National Park boasts some stunning beaches with accompanying resorts. Experience turquoise waters, golden sands and surrounding lush tropical forests.
- Tanjung Aru beach is situated in a very local area, with few tourists and a great variety of restaurants and food stalls in the evenings.

- Borneo Rainforest Lodge in Danum Valley is brilliantly located for spotting wild orangutans, silver leaf monkeys, gibbons and a plethora of birdlife.
- Mulu Marriott is a first class resort in the heart of the jungle, near the magnificent Mulu caves. It is sensitively designed to blend seamlessly into its lush forest surroundings.
- Gaya Island Resort is a luxurious and relaxing beach resort on the stunning shores of Pulau Gaya, off Kota Kinabalu.
